That very first pizza was originally designed with three basic colours in mind – each of those colours representing the colours of their new Italian flag.

The Red was symbolised by the tomato.

- The White was symbolised by the mozzarella cheese.
- The green was symbolised by the basil topping.

That very first Pizza was aptly named Pizza Margarite - and that is when the tomato became so famous and so popular.

There has always been a discrepancy as to what the tomato actually is and should be recognised as in a classification listing.

At first the tomato was regarded as a fruit, as it fast became a symbol of the staple diet originating in the kitchens of the world just before the Civil War period in the USA.

Naturally, every country has its own history for this beautiful red fruit/vegetable, but because more than twelve million tons of tomatoes are produced every year, Americans claim the tomato to be their own.

The argument for fruit as against vegetable goes back to when in order to avoid taxes up until the late 1800's our tomato was classified as a fruit, however, the disputation was taken to the Supreme Court who

promptly decided against the fruit label and gave it instead the label of vegetable.

So, during its lifetime, the tomato has been thrust into three main classifications:

- Poisonous beautiful plant
- Tax-avoiding fruit
- Taxable vegetable

In our day, the humble tomato has not lost its popularity and is grown, eaten and enjoyed by many millions of people around the world.
